


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For 3-5 Octave Handbells and Optional Percussion, Double Bass, and Voice(s)



PERFORMANCE SUGGESTIONS: This arrangement can be played solely as a handbell solo. For extra spice, add the percussion parts or both percussion and double bass, If the suggested percussion instruments are unavailable, feel free to substitute or improvise. For example, two tablespoons held in one hand (one on top of the other, back to back), and hit against the palm of the other hand, could be substituted for the woodblock. If desired, a choir or soloist could also sing. The words have been provided for that possibility. When the vocal part is performed, text painting of "wind" and "rain" in meas. 12-17 may be achieved by adding a suspended cymbal and wind chimes. The cymbal should enter with the woodblock and play a roll ending on the downbeat of the next measure (on "wind"), followed by the wind chimes portraying the rain drops. Be creative and have fun.

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








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
